## Tackling Global Humanitarian System Failure: A Novel Solution for Community-Led Resilience in the Age of Aid Cuts, Conflict, and Climate Crisis

---

### Problem Overview

The world in 2026 faces a convergence of crises that have pushed the global humanitarian system to a breaking point. Armed conflict, climate change, forced displacement, and acute food insecurity are surging to historic highs, while the international aid system-long the backbone of crisis response-has been severely weakened by unprecedented funding cuts and systemic failures<sup>[2][4]</sup>. This “New World Disorder” is characterized by more active wars than at any time since World War II, record numbers of displaced people, and a collapse in global support for the most vulnerable<sup>[6]</sup>.

**Armed conflict** is at record highs, with one in seven people globally living under the threat of war. Conflicts are more widespread, persistent, and deadly, driving unprecedented humanitarian fallout and forced displacement<sup>[6]</sup>. In 2024, nearly 240,000 people were killed in violent events, a 23% increase year-on-year, and forced displacement reached a historic 122 million people by April 2025<sup>[3][4]</sup>.

**International aid** is being cut at a time of growing need. The United States, historically the largest donor, has slashed support for humanitarian aid, with 83% of USAID programs cancelled by March 2025. Other major donors have also reduced their aid budgets, resulting in a projected 1.8 million additional deaths in 2025 alone, including nearly 700,000 children under five. If funding gaps persist, as many as 14 million preventable deaths could occur by 2030<sup>[2]</sup>.

**Global hunger** is becoming deeper and deadlier, especially in crisis-affected countries. Thirty-seven million people are now facing IPC Phase 4 (emergency level food insecurity), the highest figure since 2021, with 86% of these cases in the world’s most fragile countries<sup>[8]</sup>. In South Sudan, for example, 7.56 million people (53% of the population) are projected to face severe acute food insecurity during the 2026 lean season<sup>[8]</sup>.

**Forced displacement** has reached historic levels, with 123.2 million people forcibly displaced by the end of 2024. Four out of five displaced people have been uprooted by conflict, violence, or persecution in the world’s most crisis-affected countries<sup>[4]</sup>.

**Climate change** is fueling new weather extremes and shocks. Natural disasters such as flooding and droughts are increasing in both frequency and severity, compounding food insecurity and economic instability. For example, southern Africa experienced catastrophic floods in early 2026, with rainfall intensity increased by 40% since pre-industrial times due to human-driven climate change<sup>[10]</sup>.

**Health threats** are multiplying, with weakened pandemic preparedness, rising health misinformation, and vaccine hesitancy undermining global health security<sup>[12]</sup>. Cuts to health aid have reduced critical services by up to 70% in some countries, and misinformation is eroding trust in vaccines and institutions<sup>[12]</sup>.

**Systemic failures** in the humanitarian system are now evident. The traditional model-reliant on large, centralized aid agencies and international funding-has proven unable to adapt to the scale, complexity, and duration of today's crises. Funding is insufficient, slow, and often fails to reach the most affected communities<sup>[1][14][15]</sup>. Local actors and communities, who are best positioned to respond, are frequently sidelined or under-resourced<sup>[17][19]</sup>.

## Rationale for Selection

This problem-**the collapse of the global humanitarian system amid escalating conflict, climate shocks, and aid cuts**-was selected because of its **scale, urgency, and cascading impact** on nearly every other global challenge.

### Scale

- **Humanitarian needs are at historic highs:** Over 360 million people require humanitarian assistance, and 123 million are forcibly displaced<sup>[4][15]</sup>.
- **Conflicts are more deadly and widespread** than at any time since World War II, with one in seven people living under threat of war<sup>[6]</sup>.
- **Food insecurity and malnutrition** are at emergency levels in dozens of countries, with tens of millions at risk of famine<sup>[8]</sup>.

### Urgency

- **Aid cuts are immediate and severe:** The U.S. and other donors have slashed funding, leaving only 11% of required humanitarian funding met for 2025, and 79 million fewer people expected to receive assistance this year<sup>[2]</sup>.
- **Lives are at stake:** An estimated 1.8 million additional deaths occurred in 2025 due to aid cuts, with projections of up to 14 million preventable deaths by 2030 if gaps persist<sup>[2]</sup>.
- **Systemic risk is rising:** The World Economic Forum's Global Risks Report 2026 identifies geopolitical instability, societal polarization, misinformation, and extreme weather as top risks, all of which are exacerbated by humanitarian system failure<sup>[20]</sup>.

### Impact

- **Cascading crises:** The breakdown of humanitarian response amplifies the effects of conflict, displacement, hunger, and disease, creating feedback loops that deepen instability<sup>[3][4]</sup>.
- **Vulnerable populations are hardest hit:** Women, children, the elderly, and marginalized groups face disproportionate risks, including malnutrition, violence, and loss of livelihoods<sup>[8]</sup>.

- **Global security and stability are threatened:** The erosion of humanitarian norms and capacity undermines peace, increases migration pressures, and destabilizes regions<sup>[5][6]</sup>.

- **Integrated microgrid and storage:** Each hub is powered by a hybrid renewable energy microgrid (solar, wind, or other locally appropriate sources) with advanced storage (e.g., iron-air batteries), ensuring reliable power for critical services even during grid failures or disasters<sup>[22][23]</sup>.

- **Climate adaptation and livelihoods:** Hubs support climate-smart agriculture, water management, and skills training, building long-term resilience<sup>[17]</sup>.
- **Digital connectivity and information:** Hubs provide trusted information, countering misinformation and supporting education, health, and livelihoods<sup>[12]</sup>.
